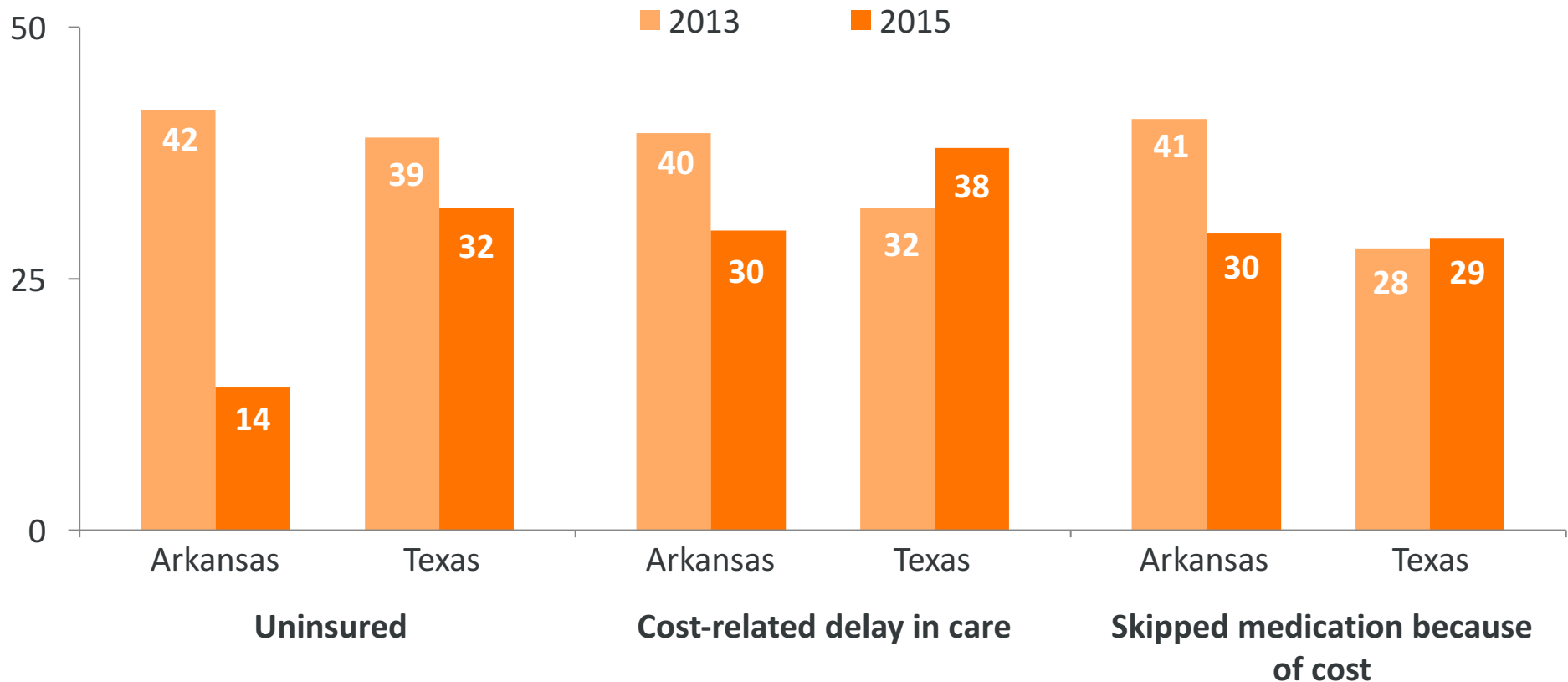


# Greater Gains in Coverage and Access for Low-Income Adults in Arkansas Compared to Texas

Note: Analysis in the exhibit excludes Kentucky.

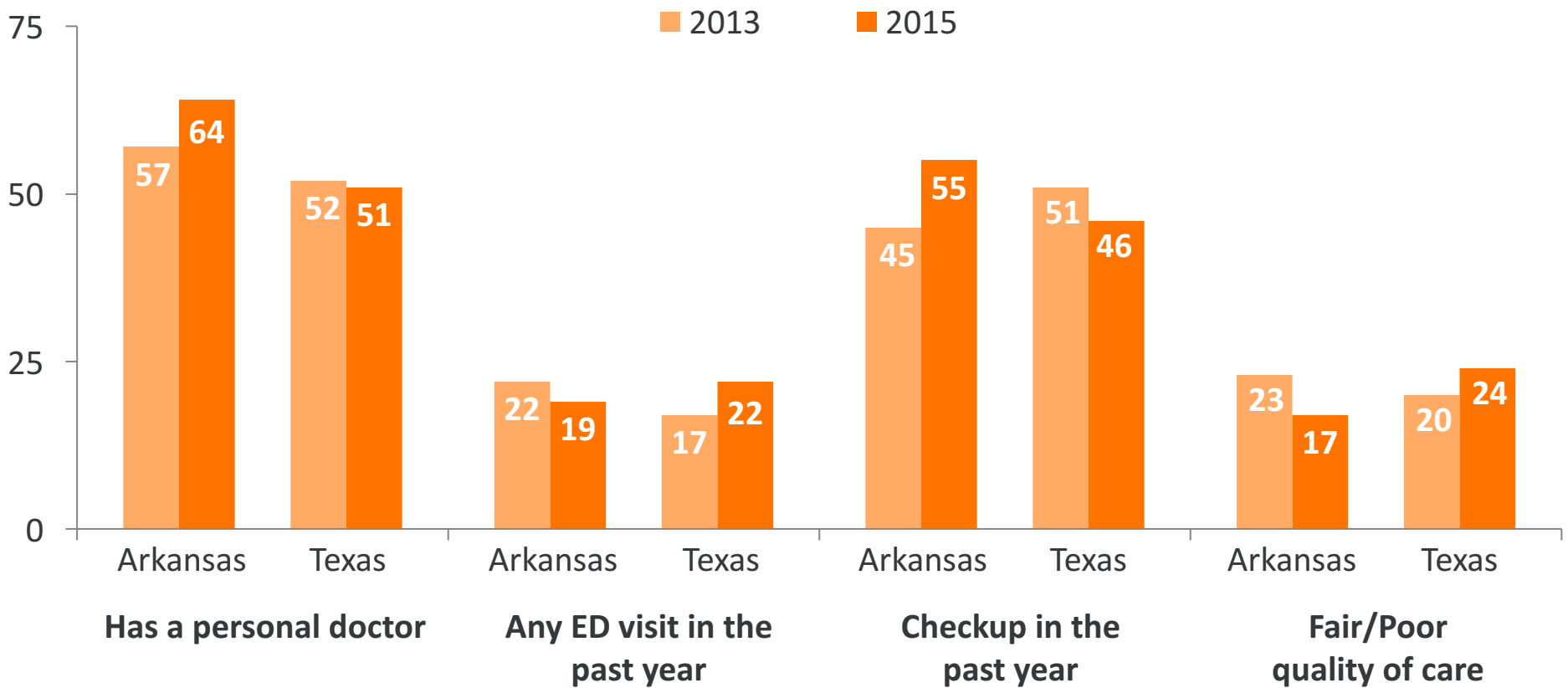

Note: Analysis in the exhibit excludes Kentucky.

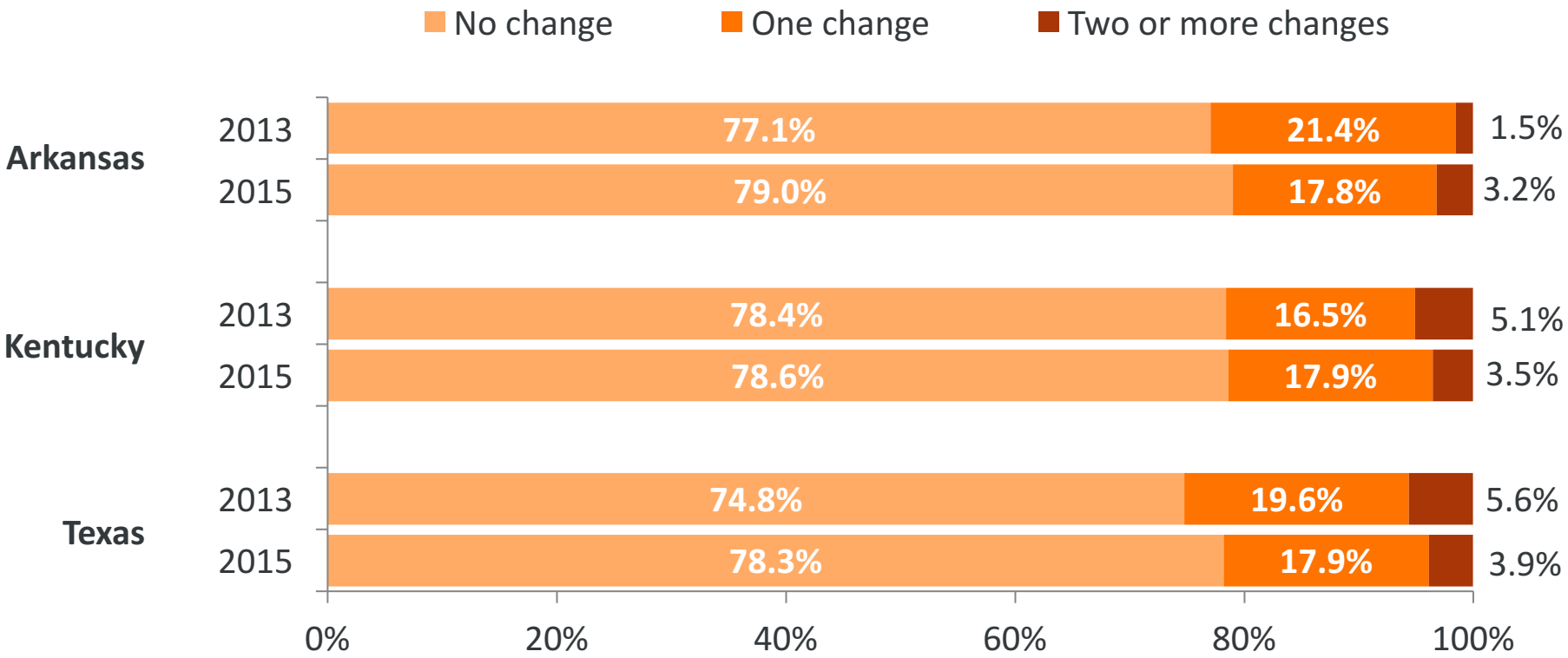
