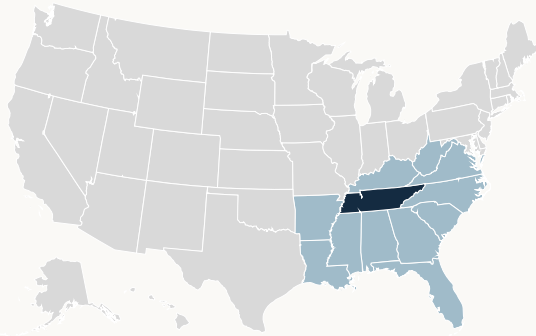

Tennessee ranks #39 overall.

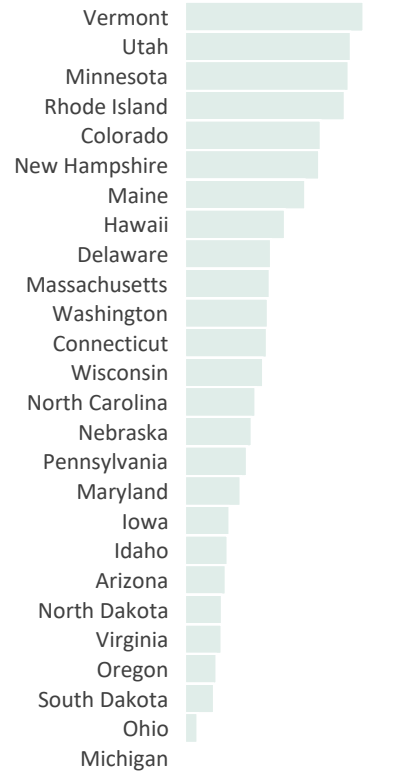
