

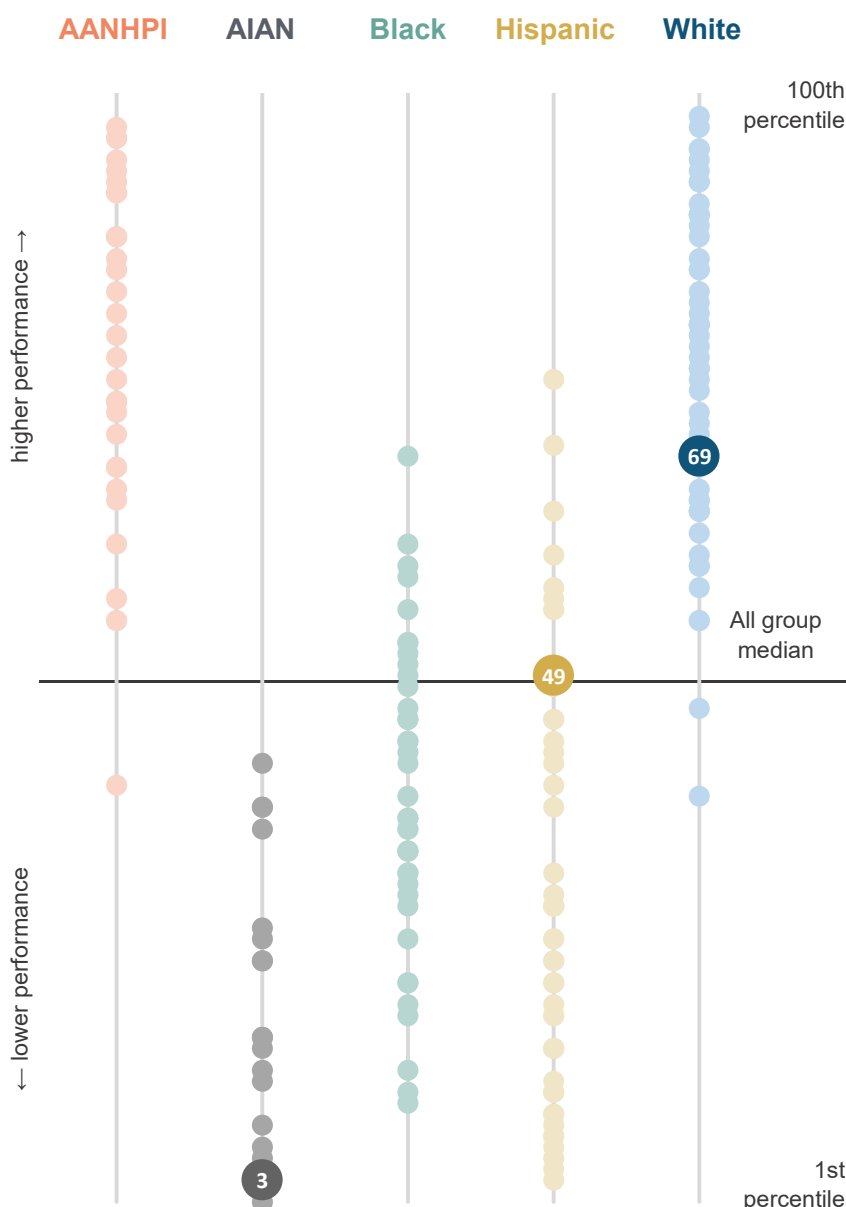
# How well does the health care system in Montana work for people of different racial and ethnic groups?

In Montana, **White people** experienced the **best health care outcomes, access, and quality**, scoring in the 69th percentile among all population groups nationally.

**AIAN people** experienced the **worst health care outcomes, access, and quality** in the state, scoring in the 3rd percentile.

Compared to other states in the Rocky Mountain region, Montana has **more severe** racial and ethnic health disparities.

# How well does the health system in Montana work for people from different racial and ethnic groups and across different dimensions of care?

## AANHPI

## AIAN

Montana ranks 18th among the 21 states we were able to rank. This indicates that the state's health system performance for AIAN people was among the worst compared to other states.

Health outcomes ranking:	<b>19</b> (of 23) is among the worst
Health care access ranking:	<b>16</b> (of 21) is among the worst
Health care quality ranking:	<b>15</b> (of 25) is worse than the average

## Black

## Hispanic

Montana ranks 9th among the 49 states we were able to rank. This indicates that health system performance for Hispanic people was better than the average compared to other states.

Health outcomes ranking:	<b>47</b> (of 50) is among the worst
Health care access ranking:	<b>8</b> (of 50) is better than the average
Health care quality ranking:	<b>10</b> (of 50) is better than the average

## White

Montana ranks 35th among the 51 states we were able to rank. This indicates that the health system performance for white people was worse than the average compared to other states.

Health outcomes ranking:	<b>15</b> (of 51) is better than the average
Health care access ranking:	<b>47</b> (of 51) is among the worst
Health care quality ranking:	<b>37</b> (of 51) is worse than the average
